

Is your House really Insured correctly?

Is your home situated on the same land title as your farm?

Insurers have recently responded to media reports of home and contents policies being cancelled or claims denied, on grounds that clients were running income-generating businesses or hobbies from their properties and had not disclosed this activity to their Insurance company.

Your insurer has a responsibility to work within the terms and conditions of their provided policy wording, your Duty of Disclosure to your insurer requires you to maintain open and full communication about the property;



including any income-earning activities that may be linked to the home. It is never too late to have the discussion and when both parties have a full understanding of the level of cover required, both can be assured that the correct policy is in place, providing adequate coverage. You may even discover that you need to hold a separate insurance policy, for example: if you hold a regular stall at the local markets, your home policy will not extend to this activity.

Operating a business of any size from your home, whether it is small or large, must be disclosed to your Insurer and we also suggest that when you have a discussion with your insurance company ask them to note the business activity down on your schedule, in case a claim arises down the track.

It is also worth mentioning that advising your insurer of your in-home business or that your dwelling is situated on a farm does not necessarily subject your policy to a possible increase of premium or cancellation. However, it does ensure that you have the right level and type of cover, to ensure you are correctly covered in the event of the claim.

CANE FIRING PERMITS

Growers needing a Seasonal Permit to burn standing cane, tops and trash should contact their local Fire Warden for assistance. While the areas remain unchanged, there have been a few changes to the designated Fire Warden in some areas.

Growers can find their respective fire warden by accessing the **Fire Warden Finder** on the RFS web page (see link below).

Things to remember:

- Fire Wardens can only issue permits for their particular area
- Fire Wardens are volunteers and may not be able to issue a permit on the spot
- Applicants need to give their neighbour sufficient notification of their intention to apply, usually 72 hrs, but this is up to the warden's discretion
- Wardens may wish to inspect blocks/ breaks etc, especially if a new applicant, so planning ahead is wise

AGRICULTURAL VEHICLE CHRISTMAS CURFEW

CANEGROWERS has met with the National Heavy Vehicle Regulator, the Department of Transport and Main Roads and the Queensland Police Service to clear the way to allow the crush to continue into what is known as the **Christmas curfew**.

The period between Christmas and New Year when oversize agricultural vehicles i.e. harvesters are not allowed access to state controlled roads

Operators who will need to access these roads during the curfew can apply for exemption permits which will be approved based on the merits of the application.

The applications need to be received with sufficient time to allow them to be processed and will need to be fully completed with a comprehensive travel management plan.

WILMAR SUGAR CRUSHING UPDATE



- The Proserpine crop has been revised upwards from 1.7M tonnes to 1.78M tonnes
 an increase of 4.7 per cent on the previous estimate.
- With rain forecast in the coming days, the operations team is preparing a work plan to make good use of potential downtime.
- We currently expect to finish the season in late December.

REEF PROTECTION REGULATIONS ROLL-OUT & INFO SESSIONS

The next round of the strengthened Reef protection regulations is due to commence on 1 December 2022 and includes minimum practice agricultural standards for:

Sugarcane: Fitzroy, Burnett Mary

Grazing: Wet Tropics, Mackay Whitsunday,

Burnett Mary

Bananas: Burdekin, Mackay Whitsunday,

Fitzroy, Burnett Mary

From this date, the minimum practice standards will have commenced in all Reef regions for bananas, sugarcane and beef cattle grazing.

The Office of the Great Barrier Reef is offering online information sessions in mid-November for producers, to help them understand the requirements and what they need to do to comply.


separate online information Initially, two sessions have been set - one for sugarcane growers and another session for cattle graziers. Additional sessions will be added if this is required, pending demand. Advance rate increase

QSL's Standard Advance rate will increase by 5% to 70% from this week. The new payment rate will reflect indicative pool values as of 26 August 2022 and represents a \$42/tonne IPS net increase to the QSL Standard Advance Rate Default Payment.

Funding available

- Riparian fencing for stock control (up to 40% of total cost to a maximum of \$6,000/km)

- Off stream watering points (up to 40% of total cost to a maximum of \$7,000, or \$11,000 if a new bore is required for the first watering point; and a maximum of \$2000 for each additional watering point).



We can be proactive in maintaining and enhancing the resilience of our streambanks and riparian areas by installing fencing and associated off-stream watering points to control stock access and exclude pest animals.

- protect crops by removing safe havens for pest animals
- improve property values and aesthetics

- prevents loss of productive agricultural land.

STRONG SUGAR MARKET A TWO-EDGED SWORD

The current rally in AUD sugar prices is a combination of a robust NY#11 sugar contract and a weak AUD. The former is largely due to the continuing squeeze on nearby demand for raw sugar with a healthy whites premium and a Brazilian crop that is getting hit with harvest delays. The AUD remains under pressure from a rampaging USD linked to continuing rate hike speculation from the Fed Reserve.


Growers who use our Call and Target mechanisms, have been taking advantage of this rally with the 2023 season filled at \$600/t, 2024 season \$560/t and 2025 season \$535/t. Current season prices are trading up to \$660/t for Call and Target pricing and GMPRS to \$650/t.

We are taking lots of calls from growers getting updates on their actual sugar tonnage and estimated final deliveries in order to take advantage of these fantastic prices. Fortunately, most growers using our GMPRS product have been conservative on pricing their final 27 per cent of GEI sugar tonnes and can incrementally price as their cane is delivered, which is giving them a great result.

The other side of the coin is that growers who are fully priced may be in a position where sold tonnes are greater than estimated delivered tonnes. Given today's prices, this will indicate a negative washout position should the cane not be delivered.

It is important to speak with your local marketing consultant as soon as possible if you are in doubt about meeting your forward commitments. We have options available to assist growers and the sooner we can fully assess your situation, the sooner we can plan on managing possible outcomes.

The great thing with Wilmar's Call and Target products is that growers can take control of their final sugar price. When combined with our GMPRS product, growers can make the pricing decision on more than 90 per cent of their final GEI sugar price. This puts control back in the growers' hands and allows them to underwrite their production in forward years.
